What makes something a co-operative?



These things are true for **all** co-operatives:



- 1. Anyone can join a co-operative.

No-one can make you join a co-operative.







- 2. Every member has an equal say and an equal vote.
- Every member has an equal say about how the co-operative uses its money.
- 4. No-one except the members can tell a co-operative what to do.



- 5. Co-operatives help people to learn, get new skills and find out information.
- 6. Co-operatives help each other



7. Co-operatives care about the community
